The College of Marin librarians are faculty; we work with courses across the District to offer instruction related to information literacy and the research process. Contact us to explore ways in which information literacy can enhance learning for your students.

Request Library Instruction for Your Course

Library faculty at the College of Marin are committed to providing students, faculty, and staff with the information literacy skills needed for success inside and outside of the classroom. Library instruction sessions reflect best practices in effective and engaged teaching, and relate directly to student learning outcomes.

Library instruction is tailored to your course/assignment. Please attach the assignment and/or course outline.

Please plan at least two weeks in advance to allow the librarian time to prepare for your course. Courses can be scheduled between 8:00 AM to 7:00 PM, Monday - Thursday and 8:00 AM to 2:30 PM Friday. Also, plan to accompany your class to be an active participant during the instruction session.

The Library Classroom is located in the back of the Kentfield Campus Library. When you enter the Library, turn right, and then turn right again after the first row of books. The door to the Classroom is on the right, near the very back wall of the Library.

Book the Information Literacy Lab

The Information Literacy Lab is located in the Kentfield Campus Library, on the second floor of the Learning Resources Center. It includes 29 seats, 22 computer stations, one presenter computer station, an overhead projector, and a whiteboard.

The Information Literacy Lab is primarily reserved for scheduled library instruction. When the lab is not being used by the Library faculty for instructional purposes, it may be scheduled for other purposes based on availability within two weeks of the desired date. If the lab is not available on the desired date, please consider using other campus computer labs. The Lab is available 8:00 AM – 7:30 PM, Monday – Thursday, and 8:00 AM – 3:30 PM on Fridays.

General guidelines:

- The Information Literacy Lab is not intended for regular class meetings.
- Users are not permitted to download or alter computer software.
- The event leader is responsible for powering off all technology, cleaning the Lab, and returning furniture to its original location.
- Library faculty and staff are not responsible for personal items left in the Lab.
- Unattended items will be taken to the Circulation Desk for pickup by campus police.
- Damage or misuse of rooms and/or equipment may result in loss of access.

Please bring your personal reserve items to the circulation desk. If you would like to request that we purchase an item for course reserve, please use our Recommend A Purchase form.
